Grants for Instructional Innovation (* funds for student assistants or for instructors) * University of Nebraska On-line Curriculum Development Grant to the Department of Gerontology supported work started in Spring 2013 to transform a successful classroom course into an experimental on-line Service Learning course. In Fall 2013, the pilot version of the course was presented to 37 students. The course design is considered "leading edge" pedagogy at an international level. It includes the following fieldwork Service learning options: Students may choose to work individually or in a team. Students based in Omaha also have the option of choosing to work as a team in a blended format that involves additional work with the community and is supported by the UNO Service Learning Academy. The course is the first online service learning course in our department with a design that is leading edge at an international level. This initial presentation involves continuous evaluation, and adjustment and revision of format and content. (Content such as Social Security, Medicare, etc. is very publically being changed and challenged at time.) This pilot offering of the course was supported additionally by a co-instructor and a Department of Gerontology graduate assistant. This course also was presented in S2014. Collaborative evaluation research with the UNO Service Learning Academy had produced a paper that will be presented at the 2014 IARSLCE, revised and then submitted as a manuscript.

- * Building Bright Futures through Service Learning-P-16 Initiative (Fall 2010 to Present, supporting service learning with three to four community organizations and three to four K-12 classes from OPS, each semester (Spring, Working with Minority Elders and Fall, Programs and Services for the Elderly) typically \$200 per organization per semester, plus services of a Graduate Assistant in relation to these projects. Each semester student teams collaborate with community partners to plan and develop projects that relate to course objectives and meet real and present needs of partner organizations.
- * The first (and only) **Thompson Learning Community** (TLC) faculty member in the department of Gerontology beginning in Spring 2010 and continuing through the present. Participating departments are compensated for the faculty member's time (i.e., funds to secure adjunct faculty to teach large-enrollment courses in lieu of the TLC instructor). Participating faculty members are awarded supplementary funds for course development and enhancement, and for professional development. TLC professors provide inventive, responsive curriculum and mentoring to help students transition from introductory courses to the major of their choice. http://www.unomaha.edu/thompsonlc/Faculty.php. The Thompson model engages instructors in a socialization model of instruction and supports it with small class sizes which are designed for dialogue and faculty involvement with individuals. The syllabus is adapted per consultation with Thompson faculty in other disciplines who have the same students and with Thompson staff.
- * Initiated, applied for and, from Spring 2009 until its demise at UNO in 2013, mentored the **Synergy Program** in the Department of Gerontology. Using a brilliant concept developed by Matthew Marx in the UNO College of Arts and Sciences, developed and initially taught, then mentored fellow instructors in using the Synergy Model to teach. Synergy links two courses from different disciplines in ways that provide students a coordinated set of learning experiences and facilitate development of student "cohortlike" relationships that endure outside the classroom and beyond the course/s. Synergy was funded by grants from the Omaha Community Foundation which provided stipends for course development, funds for materials and activities that enrich the learning experience, and, for departments such as gerontology, funds to supplement faculty and handle the usually large enrollments in the courses used to make up a Synergy pair (Synergy courses are limited to 10 to 20 students). Department of Gerontology Synergy Courses are "Introduction to Gerontology" with "English Composition I", and "Death and Dying" with "English Composition II". Students receive separate credit and a separate grade for each of the two "component" courses linked by "Synergy".

Advanced Placement/ Duel Enrollment Program Grants (Summer 2009 and renewed annually–Present.) PI, Lyn Holley, funds a non-classroom teaching innovation that provides gerontology-relevant management experience for student members of the UNO Chapter of *Sigma Phi Omega*, the national academic honor society for Gerontology. Students manage an annual intergenerational poetry contest that engages middle and secondary school with elders in the community who are older than 50. The contest, "Poetry to Bridge Generations" (formerly, Poetry Across the Generations: Building Bridges to Success for Urban Youth) and its web site have been awarded \$5,000 to \$7000. each year . http://www.omahapoetsplace.net

Dorot Volunteer Program Grant http://www.dorotusa.org (Spring 2009 and renewed annually – Present,) to UNO chapter of *Sigma Phi Omega*, PI/Faculty Advisor, Lyn Holley. The grant

partially funds a non-classroom teaching innovation that provides gerontology-relevant management experience for student members of the UNO Chapter of *Sigma Phi Omega*, the national academic honor society for Gerontology. The innovative program is "UNO Student Athletes and Elders: A Community of Interest". Sigma Phi Omega student managers and other student volunteers manage the project with guidance from the Faculty Advisor, and are recognized annually for having performing as managers, which translates into "lines" on resumes. Grant funding supports expenses of meetings at assisted living facilities and promotion of the program. \$500 has been granted each year.

Civic Participation Grant Spring 2009,. PI, Lyn M. Holley, PhD. Civic Engagement of Minority Elders through Intergenerational Transfer of Culture: Planning and Evaluation to Ensure Sustainability Description: This project engages students in helping community partner organizations organize and evaluate activities that build or strengthen relationships of minority elders with youth in their communities. Award: \$1500 for expenses of fieldwork.

Serving Urban Youth Grant Spring 2009, , PI, Lyn M. Holley, PhD

Serving Urban Youth Project: Sustaining Community Dialogue

This project addressed challenges of youth in disadvantaged circumstances (four distinct minority groups in Omaha: African American, Asian American, Hispanic/Latino American, and Native American) through partnering with four community organizations (one per minority group) to provide opportunities for intergenerational transfer of culture, and for healing intergenerational dialogue. \$800 for expenses of community meetings for service learning projects.

Coordination with other grants: This mini-grant was coordinated with two other grants to accomplish the full range of course objectives. The two grants were: Civic Participation Grant (PI, Lyn Holley, Spring 2009) and a grant that supported Community-based Theatre Projects (PI, Douglas Paterson, Spring 2009)
