1. \_\_\_\_\_ was promoted to Lieutenant General and appointed General-in- Chief of the armies of the United States in 1864.
2. \_\_\_\_\_ was appointed Chief of Staff to the General-in-Chief in 1864. He ran routine matters of the army from Washington.
3. \_\_\_\_\_ was appointed Commander of the Military Division of the Mississippi in 1864, with the task of taking Atlanta, Georgia.
4. \_\_\_\_\_ was the Union commander in New Orleans, who was supposed to attack Mobile in 1864, but attacked Shreveport instead.
5. \_\_\_\_\_ was named commander of the Cavalry Corps of the Army of the Potomac in 1864 and later became the commander of the Army of the Shenandoah.
6. \_\_\_\_\_ was commander of the Army of the Potomac from 1863 to 1865.
7. \_\_\_\_\_ commanded the Army of Northern Virginia from 1862 to 1865.
8. \_\_\_\_\_ was the commander of Union Naval Forces at the Battle of Mobile Bay.
9. \_\_\_\_\_ commanded the Army of Tennessee, replacing Braxton Bragg, until he himself was dismissed and replaced by John Bell Hood.
10. \_\_\_\_\_ served as a battlefield nurse. She later helped found the American Red Cross.

11. **TRUE FALSE** Dr. Mary Walker served as a Union surgeon and is the only woman thus far awarded the Medal of Honor.
12. **TRUE FALSE** Colonel Frederick Lewis Douglas commanded the 54<sup>th</sup> Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry (Colored) from its activation until his death assaulting Fort Wagner.
13. **TRUE FALSE** The U. S. Sanitary Commission was an important non-governmental organization assisting with the medical care of Union soldiers.
14. **TRUE FALSE** Major General Ambrose Burnside became known as the “King of Spades” for having his men dig fortifications. One normally thinks of him as an offensive-minded commander.
15. **TRUE FALSE** LTG James Longstreet, commander of the I Corps, Army of Northern Virginia, was killed in the Battle of the Wilderness not far from where LTG Thomas “Stonewall” Jackson had been mortally wounded a year before.
16. **TRUE FALSE** The Hunley was the first submersible to sink an enemy vessel.
17. **TRUE FALSE** The “Overland Campaign” is the term used for the March on Atlanta in 1864.
18. **TRUE FALSE** GEN Nathan Bedford Forrest commanded the Confederate Trans-Mississippi Department during the latter part of the War. He was one of eight Confederate full generals, his appointment being in the Provisional Army of the Confederate States instead of the Confederate States Army.
19. **TRUE FALSE** MG George H. Thomas led “the March to the Sea” from Atlanta to Savannah in the latter part of 1864.
20. **TRUE FALSE** The Confederacy enlisted many black soldiers during the war.
