Footnote

John Smith, "Socrates," in *Stanford Encyclopedia of Philosophy*.

Subsequent Citations

-A full citation is only necessary the first time that you cite a source.

-If you cite the same source more than once consecutively (in a row), you may substitute the word *Ibid* for the footnote information in the second and subsequent citations. If the citation is on the same page number as the first citation, use the word *Ibid* only, followed by a period. If the citation is on a different page, use the word *Ibid*, followed by a period, then a comma, space, then the page number. End the citation with a period.

-If you cite a different source and then return to a source that you have already cited, you may use a shortened citation. In this case, you would provide the author's last name, the title of the work or article, and the page number only. (Example: Cicero, "Fear and the Spread of Roman Tyranny," 25.)
