About the Keynote Speaker:

Dr. Andrew Wiest is the Charles W. Moorman Distinguished Professor of History and founding director of the Dale Center for the Study of War and Society at the University of Southern Mississippi. He is the author of *The Boys of '67: Charlie Company's War in Vietnam*, *Vietnam: A View from the Front Lines*, and *Vietnam's Forgotten Army: Heroism and Betrayal in the ARVN*, which received the 2009 Society for Military History Distinguished Book Award for Biography. Wiest has presented his research at numerous conferences and seminars, both nationally and internationally, and served as lead historical advisor for "Vietnam in HD," a six-part series for the History Channel.
